## **AKI SICK DAY RULES CARDS FOR PATIENTS**

Vomiting or having diarrhoea or fever (high temperature) can be risky for people take some medications. These cards list the medicines that you should stop taking for a couple of days when you are ill. Looking at the card and following the simple advice on it can help protect your kidneys.

## Medicines to stop on sick days

ACE inhibitors: medicine names ending in "pril"

eg. lisinopril, perindopril, ramipril

ARBs: medicine names ending in "sartan"

eg. losartan, candesartan, valsartan

NSAIDs: anti-inflammatory pain killers

eg. ibuprofen, diclofenac, naproxen

Diuretics: sometimes called "water pills"

eg. furosemide, spironolactone, indapamide, bendroflumethiazide

Metformin: a medicine for diabetes
